March Sunday Worship

A Time to Journey to the Cross with Jesus

The month of March is a month of activity as we conclude the season of Lent and end the month with Holy Week. Jesus cleanses the Jerusalem Temple and seeks to restore worship to its proper place – a place of prayer and glorifying God. The last two weeks of Lent point to the cross and our Lord's reminder that we too must die to self if we are to live as new people – resurrected to new life! Holy Week is by far the most important week in the history of humanity. Walk with Jesus during the week. Don't just worship on Palm Sunday and Easter. Walk with Jesus in His passion from the Last Supper to the Garden of Gethsemane and beneath the cross on Friday.

Mid-week Lenten Themes

Services begin at 7 PM Meals served between 6:00-6:30 PM on March 7, 14, and 21

We continue our mid-week Lenten theme during the month of March and into Holy Week. Our theme is **Anxious for Nothing: Finding Peace in a Chaotic World**. All of us could use some calm in our busy, hectic lives. With our daily schedules and life circumstances, anxiety also comes with it. While we can't eliminate all anxiety, it doesn't have to dominate and control our lives. During our Lenten season we will be examining Paul's exhortation and promise in his letter to the church in Philippi where he writes:

"⁴ Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! ⁵ Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. ⁶ Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. ⁸ Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable-- if anything is excellent or praiseworthy-- think about such things. ⁹ Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me-- put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you."

During our mid-week Lenten services we have been using the acronym C.A.L.M. to help us experience "the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds." We will seek to Celebrate God's goodness, Ask for God's help, Leave our concerns with Him, and Meditate on good things. Applying this acronym to your life will not only change your outlook on life, but you will be empowered to overcome your anxieties and fears in life.

March 7 – A. = Ask God for Help

Message: "Contagious Calm" ("Anxiety is needless because God is near.")

March 14 - A. = Ask God for Help

Message: "Prayer, Not Despair" ("Peace Happens when people pray.")

March 21 – L. = Leave Your Concerns with Him

Message: "Great Gratitude" ("Christ-based contentment turns us into strong people.")

Holy Week

<u>Sunday, March 25 - Palm Sunday – L. = Leave Your Concerns with Him</u>

Message: "God's Peace, Your Peace"

("You may be facing the perfect storm, but Jesus offers the perfect peace.")

Easter Sunday

April 1

Easter falls on April Fools' Day – the last time this occurred was 1945. Jesus raising from the dead and defeating death is the ultimate April Fools. No one had ever risen from the dead and walked among us before. The apostle Paul would later write one of the most important chapters in the Bible on the resurrection (1 Corinthians 15). In this chapter, Paul states that Jesus is the "firstfruits" of those who have died. Because Jesus has been raised from the dead, we too, shall be raised from the grave when we die. The last enemy to be defeated is death and Jesus has crushed death (Jesus has fulfilled the promise of God in Genesis 3:15 where Jesus "will crush the head" of the serpent (that is, the devil – our foe and enemy). Join us for worship on April 1st as we celebrate this all-important truth and victory. As Paul concludes his chapter in 1 Corinthians 15: "But thanks be to God! He gives US the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

Pastor Steve's Letter: "Not Since 1945"

Not since 1945 has Ash Wednesday been observed on Valentine's Day (February 14) and Easter on April Fools' Day (April 1) in the same year. The last time this happened our country was involved in a world war against an evil regime that proclaimed genocide against all Jews and God's chosen people. Allied forces were marching on Berlin and the Nazi army which Adolf Hitler had assembled to carry out this unbelievable evil against a certain people because they were not Aryan by birth. On May 7, 1945, Germany officially surrendered after murdering 6 million Jews and millions more from other nations who combined forces to defeat Germany. Germany may be our ally now, but evil governments continue to reign across our world, bringing havoc and terror where they go. Genocide still continues with its ethnic cleansing, not to mention the millions of aborted births that have been ended by abortion in the United States alone since 1973. The message of Christ and His death on the cross is still the most important event and message that must be proclaimed to the very ends of the earth.

So once again we began our Lenten season with the greatest love story of all. God sent His one and only Son Jesus into our world (i.e. God's valentine to the whole world). Jesus, being in very nature God, humbled Himself and made Himself nothing and become one of us to save us from our greatest enemies – our sin, the devil, and death. We all know John 3:16 where "God so LOVED the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." So often we forget that this life is not our home. We are only sojourners and pilgrims here on earth. We have another home being prepared for us and the only way to this home is found in Jesus. When we place our lives into His care, Jesus promises to take us there one day when we die. But first, Jesus had to go to the cross to pay the penalty for our sin. When He died on that cross, He stretched His arms to show us how wide and long is the love of God for us. And when He hung on that cross, He was able to say with complete confidence before He died: "It is finished! It is accomplished! Our penalty of sin has been paid in full!"

And that is where April Fools' comes into the picture. Everyone who believed that Jesus was the "hope to redeem Israel" (Luke 24:21), now believed it was all over. Death and evil had won again (like it always has since the Fall in Genesis 3). But here's the April Fool's message: Death is not the victor. Jesus is the victor. God raised Jesus from the dead, just as Jesus had promised. And then the celebration began – sin, death and the devil have been defeated once and for all time. Sin may still raise its ugly head due to free will, but sin and death do not have the final say. God's love has won the day! The devil's greatest fear has just happened. Jesus stayed on the cross to forgive our sin and restore our standing before God, and God has raised Jesus as the sign that we, too, shall be raised from the dead when we die.

As we continue through the season of Lent and Holy Week, let us consider these two calendar events – Valentine's Day and April Fools' Day. Let us remember the greatest love story shown to us by God when He sent Jesus into our world and into your life and mine. Let us remember the greatest April Fools' joke on the devil when Jesus rose from the grave victorious. Every time I commit another Christian's earthly body to the ground in a cemetery, my heart rejoices for that soul. Although we mourn the passing of that person's life, I rejoice because they are now whole – without disease, pain, suffering or tears. Jesus has defeated death and there is a resurrection that one can only imagine. Paul reminds the church in Thessalonica to "encourage one another with these words" (1Thessalonians 4:18).

I, for one, am living in the reality of God's greatest love story for me this year (with Ash Wednesday on February 14th) and in the comfort of knowing death has been defeated once and for all in Christ (God's greatest April Fool's message to the world on Easter morning – April 1st). May you come to know and rejoice in the importance of these two days in the sight of the Lord.

TANZANIA 2018

As you may know, this summer's partnership trip to Tanzania is two-fold. Six of our CTS members will stay in the village and build/strengthen relationships with our parish partners, while four members (Amanda Cyboron, Emily Svitak, Lonnie Svitak and myself) will embark on a climb of Mt. Kilimanjaro, the highest point in Africa. Pastor Matt and his two sons (Josh and Micah) will also join us. The intent of the climb is to raise funds for the center for children with disabilities that our CTS youth helped to build in Tanzania during the summer of 2015. For each mile we climb, we will be seeking financial support to help with the operating costs of the center. We are climbing for the kids who can't! The funds pledged will help to pay salaries, provide food for the students, operate the facility and help guarantee continued sustainability of the center.

We will be going up the mountain on what's called "The Machame Route." It is 37 miles, gate to gate, and it will take us 7 days to complete. We will be physically challenged through five different climate zones and terrains, ranging from tropical rainforest to the arctic peak of the mountain. The elevation of the peak is over 19,000 feet, so our oxygen level will also be compromised. However, Philippians 4:13 says "I can do everything through him who gives me strength." God has a plan for us and we know he will be with us for each and every step and will watch over us. I also plan to carry photos of the children from the center in my pocket. So, when I am feeling the weight of the challenge, the image of the kids will help to push me to the next level. Besides the climb, I am also looking forward to reuniting with our African family members who have been praying that we return to Tanzania. Their faith is beyond measure and their hospitality is like nothing you have ever experienced.

TANZANIA 2018

The partnership between CTS and Msaranga Mandaka and its four sub-parishes has grown over the past several years. Those traveling this summer will be Mary Weich, Tara Peters, Emily Svitak, Amanda Cyboron, Charlie Skoglund, Louise Skoglund, Brian Anderson, Michelle Anderson, Lonnie Svitak and Margaret Svitak. Some in this group have been to Tanzania once and some have traveled there twice. The group traveling in the summer 2018 trip will have five who are traveling there for the first time. We are very excited to be able to add depth to this partnership. This partnership has developed to mutually support each other in ministry. Truly a group from Msaranga Mandaka parish has been meeting for years – yes, years – to pray for us at CTS. We have worked on projects together to improve their living quality such as a new well with clean water and a new building to house the center for children with disabilities.

With this visit I am excited to reconnect with friends I met in the summer of 2014. And with this summer's visit I will be part of the "village team" which is six people from the above named group (Mary, Tara, Charlie, Louise, Michelle and myself) who will remain at the parish area during our stay. I sought to establish prayer sisters between CTS and Msaranga Mandaka parishes. There are currently 20 women from CTS actively involved in praying for 26 women in Tanzania, while those 26 women in Tanzania are praying for 20 women from CTS. These numbers increase over time, which is wonderful. I am most excited to physically meet these women on a personal basis this coming summer! We will have an opportunity to come alongside them to see how they live, harvest food, and provide for their families.

Thank you for your support of this partnership – it truly is a life-changing experience for us and for God's Kingdom on this earth.

Board of Administration Meeting January 15, 2018 6:30 p.m.

Present: Steve Freese, Warren Bennett, Greg Moen, Jan Puls, Richard Hillrichs, Pastor Steve

Richard called this meeting to order and offered the opening prayer.

Minutes of the last board meeting were reviewed. Warren raised a concern about the daycare holiday and vacation pay, specifically, that Amanda was not given any; however, that was not in their request. This is something that should be included in job descriptions for daycare staff. Jan offered a motion that the Board of Spiritual Oversight offer recommendations regarding paid time off and assure that daycare employees have job descriptions. Steve seconded the motion, and suggested the issue of what is considered full-time vs. part-time be determined at a joint board meeting. Motion carried.

Bills to be paid: G&B Sprinklers (fall service) = \$75.00; approved to be paid.

Greg's financial report was reviewed. Motion by Steve to transfer \$650 from the Good Samaritan fund to the pastor's Good Samaritan checking account, as well as \$995.75 from the Holiday Boutique fund to the general fund, seconded by Warren. Motion carried.

Richard shared information about the endowment account when it was developed in 2004.

Pastor Steve shared the estimate received from T&H to drywall the sanctuary and exterior walls in the fellowship hall. CTS would be responsible for the cost of having the drywall professionally painted. Greg pointed out that there is money in the memorial fund that could be used to pay for the paint. We would need estimates for paint and labor. Motion to approve work as per estimate from T&H Drywall, to be paid by the family of Galen Thompson, seconded by Warren. Motion carried, and Pastor will let Susan know.

Pastor Steve reported that that the Board of Spiritual Oversight is discussing going back to one council and asked how members of this board felt about it. All were in favor, and Jan offered a motion to explore the possibility of having one council versus two boards, seconded by Steve. Motion carried.

No report from personnel or stewardship committees.

Warren reported that the top motor in the dishwasher doesn't work and needs to be replaced. The part is covered under warranty and has been ordered. CTS is responsible for the service call and labor, approximately \$100.

Motion by Warren to adjourn, seconded by Jan. Meeting adjourned at 8:15 p.m.
