PASTOR STEVE'S LETTER: "THE IMPORTANCE OF JOURNEYING TOGETHER"

Many of you have noticed that I have led two Journey groups at Christ the Servant in the past two years. The Journey is modeled in such a way that it reflects the way Jesus instructed and taught His disciples while on earth. Jesus gathered 12 people, and asked them to follow Him for three years (sharing, learning, asking, observing, etc.). After those three years, Jesus released these disciples into the world to make disciples of Jesus who would in turn make disciples on a continual basis. I have often wondered what this model of Jesus would look like in the Church today. It seems that the Church is good at teaching the tenants of Jesus' words but often fails in teaching its members how to go and make disciples of others. As a result, we have a passive Church that simply comes to church, hears a sermon, volunteers to do a few simple tasks, and goes about its daily duties at home and work.

What if we returned to the model that Jesus used and has worked for hundreds of years since? What if there was a safe place to gather with others to hear the call of Jesus upon their lives? What if disciple-making was not the primary responsibility alone of the pastor or others trained in seminaries? What if disciple-making occurred with you? Would that excite you or scare you away? Well, the good news is that Jesus gave this model to the Church. Jesus did not go to the scholars in Je-

rusalem and train them. Instead, He went into the countryside and called common, ordinary people to follow Him. And as He called them, amazing things happened! The Holy Spirit came upon them and they did amazing things in the name of Jesus. That same Jesus is here today inviting you to follow Him!

Once again I will be leading a group of people (up to 12) on a weekly Journey, beginning in September and ending in April. My goal is to teach a few more Journey courses and then release those who have completed the Journey with me to begin to lead Journey classes of their own. I envision a time when 3-7 Journey groups will be meeting on a weekly basis at Christ the Servant. As Timothy Jones wrote: "*Faith is no do-it-yourself project. When it comes to our innermost selves, the spiritual dimension, we need what only others can bring. Imperfect as any friendship or mentoring relationships must be, we will not go far if we don't enjoy something like it. We need others with whom we can talk and pray. Without relationships that bring spiritual nurture, our lives with God will suffer.*" Personal transformation happens BEST in the context of a loving community that extends grace and truth.

VantagePoint3 has developed a three-year process in discipleship making that is the best I have seen in my 35 years of

ministry. It is not for the light-hearted! It is rooted and grounded in meeting weekly for 6-8 months, sharing life together with trusted others who desire to know who God is, who I am, and what God is up to in your life. Year One is the introduction to these questions. Year Two is developing a plan to sustain a meaningful walk with God, and Year Three is about learning how to disciple others and grow up into Christ. Participating in Year One does NOT mean you have to continue with Years Two and Three (but many of you will want to once you have completed Year One).

In order to plan for the next Journey group, I will have an informational meeting after church on the last two Sundays of July (July 19 and 26) in the front of the sanctuary. If you are absent on one of the Sundays, you can come to the other one. Please come and check it out! You will be amazed at how God has already been at work in you!

PASTOR MATT'S LETTER

Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.

Philippians 4:4

Storms at this time of year are pretty common events. In fact, since I moved to Norfolk I have gotten into the habit of getting a new roof every two years. The thing about storms is sometimes you can see them coming and other times they just come up out of nowhere and we just have to learn to buckle up and hold fast. Of course there are always benefits to these storms like needed water for plants and farms, but when you're in the storm usually we are not thinking about the benefits. When we are in the storm we are just waiting and longing for it to end, wondering what made this storm come up, or even for some perhaps, "What did I do to make this happen?" Some might even take it as far as to think that God is punishing them for something that they have done. But think about this rationally for a moment: what kind of God would we be dealing with who was going to punish everyone in my area for my sin?

Scriptures speak Jesus' word about storms in John 16:33 when He says, "In this world you will have troubles, but take heart! I have overcome the world." There are just going to be storms, but Jesus has already overcome them. Point to ponder. We need to ponder this because when the storms come we are always in danger of getting swept away by them. We can become enraged or melt into self-pity and thoughts that leave us clinging to things that can't help us in the storm or save us. But Jesus has already overcome the storms.

Sometimes when we see others in storms and we try to fix the problems for them, but truth is the storm is needed and is God's way of allowing us to grow, that's why He allows the storms to happen. We just need to learn to ride out the storm with others. Coming through the storm we can become stronger, more courageous, with greater understanding and faith than before the storm; no matter if the storm is created by us or by others, coming through the storm we grow.

So Paul gives us wisdom to live through the storm by, "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: REJOICE!" Remember He has already

overcome the storms. In the midst of the storm we should focus our attention in thankfulness toward God for all He has done for us, starting with giving us life in Jesus, and turn our attention away from the storm we will face the storm different. The greatest anchor to help prevent our getting pulled away by indulging ourselves in suffering is to recognize and place our confidence and trust in the God who already has provided so much, and still has so much more to offer. Then we can grow through the storm, rise above the storm and conquer the storm because in Jesus Christ we are more than conquerors.

Look through the storm, Jesus in us. He is Risen! The Spirit is given. Thanks be to God!


YOUTH CALENDAR

Items needed: Yellow ruled pads, steno pads, sticky notes; deodorant, children and adult Tylenol, cough medicine, Band-Aids, diapers (larger sizes); disinfectants, paper towels, toilet tissue, facial tissue; napkins, hair picks, shampoo, dishwashing liquid, laundry detergent, fabric softener, dryer sheets; gas cards, phone cards, Wal-Mart gift cards, grocery store gift cards.

HEALTH MINISTRY

OPTIMAL HEALTH

Health is more than the absence of disease. In other words, just because you're not sick doesn't mean you are healthy. Try thinking about your health on a continuum with disease and despair at one end and optimal health at the other end. Optimal health just means being as healthy as you can be, knowing that it will be different for each of us. Where are you on the continuum? This month, evaluate what small steps you can take toward optimal health.

Remember to recycle your empty medication bottles!

ABC'S FOR FUN IN THE SUN

Summer is here and we all love the outdoors. I want to share with you the ABC'S for fun in the sun. Children love to play outdoors, so remember to protect them from the sun's damaging rays. Children under 6 months of age should be shaded and protected from direct sunlight. Any time a child is outside, limit activities during 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. (when the sun's rays are most intense). To help children understand sun protection and the dangers of skin cancer, teach the ABC'S for fun in the sun. A) Stay away from the sun in the middle of the day. B) Use a sunblock with at least an

SPF of 15 and use it often. C) Cover up with a T-shirt and a wide-brimmed hat. S) Speak out and talk to your friends about sun protection.

FACTS ABOUT SKIN CANCER

According to the American Cancer Society, 1.3 million new cases of basal- or squamous-cell skin cancers (the highly curable forms) and nearly 50,000 cases of the more serious melanoma cancers are diagnosed each year. Some people are more at risk for skin cancer than others, such as those with family history, skin that is light in color or burns easily, light hair or eyes, and moles. It is recommended that people avoid direct exposure to the sun between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. If you must go outdoors during that time, do not go out without sun protection and seek shade when possible. Cover exposed skin with long sleeves, wide-brim hats, and sunglasses. Early detection of cancer is very important!

BLOOD DONATION

Thousands of patients at our hospitals are now living healthy, productive lives because blood donated by people like you was

available when they needed it. This blood supply, on which we all depend, is now in jeopardy. The rumors associated with AIDS have led to unsubstantiated fears about donating blood. But rumors are just that—rumors! Quite simply, you cannot contract AIDS from donating blood. In addition, a sophisticated test now screens out blood donated by people exposed to AIDS. The primary threat to our blood supply is a shortage of healthy blood donors. You and your family may never need blood—or never experience surgery, accidents or disasters, but if you do, safe blood will be available for you only if healthy people continue to give blood to maintain the supply. Donating is safe, simple and satisfying. Your body contains about 10-12 pints of blood, and the blood you give is quickly replaced. The entire process usually takes about 30 minutes and less than 10 minutes for the actual blood donation. Blood donors should be between the ages of 17 and 75 and weigh at least 110 pounds. Please contact your local Blood Donor Center if you are willing to donate the gift of blood.
