The Perfect Pastor

I hope this spoof on the perfect pastor will give you a good chuckle and maybe a little food for thought. *Pastor Dennis*

A few years back I received an email from a friend telling me that he was just elected chair of the pastoral call committee. The congregation was seeking a new pastor and in an effort to find out what members believed were important attributes in a new pastor he decided to ask them to complete a survey. Transition Team – Emily Svitak shared that the transition team has been meeting each Sunday for prayer. Pastor Dennis has joined in on these meetings and has been bringing forward questions of why we do what we do and how we move forward through our transition well.

Building/Grounds – Warren Bennett shared that there are some issues that have been found at the parsonage that will need to be taken care of. Warren will do some price checking to see what it will cost to update/fix these things.

Worship – Worship committee met last week and will be starting to gather before each church season to plan ahead.

Audit – Nevin Peters and Mary Ann Knee have been contacted and will be getting together with Susie Lutz and Greg Moen to complete the audit soon.

September 13th will be our celebration of Pastor Steve. Due to COVID, celebrating Steve during the last weeks he was in Norfolk was hindered, so during Rally Sunday week we will celebrate his ministry here.


Brian Anderson shared about plans to purchase video equipment to use as the equipment that is being currently used is being borrowed from the college. Having this equipment will open more opportunities to reach people/spread work via social media. Brian quoted around \$3,200 for the equipment. It is possible that the funding for this is covered through special giving. It would not have to come from the budget. Bob Lutz moved to authorize the memorial fund committee to purchase the recording equipment per Brian Anderson's recommendation. Warren Bennett seconded. Motion carried.

Charlie Skoglund shared about concerns about how communion as it has been happening. The little cups have been difficult for some people to open and are prone to spills. He brought forward some suggestions about how we could move as much 'back to normal' as we could. We would need ushers that are seating people with adequate space. Communion would be continuous with assistants using gloves/hand sanitizer/masks. We would go to using wafers and disposable wine cups that are spaced adequately.

Pastor Dennis mentioned that state regulations concerning dispersing items like communion are still in place until July 31. Discussion followed about the struggles and concerns about the possibilities of finding some normalcy in communion, as well as the enforcing the wearing of masks. In all of this discussion, the council wants to make sure that through all decisions made, we don't want to create division within the church. We want to be able to follow guidelines and offer a place where people feel comfortable to come to worship. In going forward, we will continue with the guidelines and communion procedures as we have been doing. This will be re-evaluated weekly and at the next council meeting. Worship committee will be meeting on August 3rd and can discuss possibilities according to updated guidelines at that time. Brian Anderson is going to write up a statement from the council about what we have discussed. This will be emailed to the congregation and put in the bulletin this week.

Pastor Dennis shared his report. He has been meeting with the transition team and getting to know more about the church through that. He will also be joining the worship committee on August 3rd to plan worship through the end of the church calendar year.

Warren Bennett closed the meeting with prayer. The next meeting will be August 17th.
